Volunteer Spotlight: American Legion Riders Chapter 220

This month, our Volunteer Spotlight looks a little different—as it should—because we're celebrating not just an individual, but an outstanding local organization whose dedication and service have truly made a difference: American Legion Riders Chapter 220.

From the moment they officially joined the Nocona Chamber of Commerce in January of this year, the Legion Riders have hit the ground running. Their involvement has gone far beyond showing up; they've consistently rolled up their sleeves, lent a hand, and brought meaningful contributions to every event and initiative they've touched.

Their commitment to our mission is apparent in every corner of Chamber life. At each monthly meeting, members of Chapter 220 are present, engaged, and vocal. By actively participating in discussions and offering thoughtful input, they help ensure the Chamber board hears directly from members before making decisions that affect the whole business community. Their voices have been a guiding light in aligning our direction with the values and hopes of our membership.

The Legion Riders have also become an integral part of welcoming new businesses to Nocona. Whether it's standing proudly at ribbon cuttings or helping to spread the word about new Chamber members, they show up with encouragement and enthusiasm, making newcomers feel immediately part of something bigger.

Their event support has been nothing short of indispensable. From the early stages of planning to the final moments of clean-up, Chapter 220 has been all in. They played a critical role in advertising, promoting, and bringing energy to our Mardi Gras celebration—many of you no doubt noticed the incredible motorcycle participation in this year's parade, a direct result of their efforts.

At our Roaring '20s-themed Chamber Banquet, the American Legion Riders didn't just stop at winning Best Decorated Table—they went a step further and added a surprise twist by hiding prizes around the room for guests to discover. It was one of the most talked-about and memorable moments of the evening, showing once again their creativity, thoughtfulness, and commitment to fun.

And then there was Cruisin' Nocona Weekend—an event that simply wouldn't have been possible without them. From set-up and registration to helping coordinate the Cruisin' lunch, participating in the cruise itself, and hosting a pancake breakfast, Chapter 220 wore more hats than we can count. They were also vendors, ran a raffle, and somehow still made themselves available throughout the weekend to help wherever needed.

Their spirit of volunteerism, leadership, and teamwork exemplifies what community service should look like. Their willingness to serve, not for recognition but for the good of the town, is something we all admire and appreciate deeply.

As a small token of our appreciation, we want to take a moment to share more about the broader mission and work of the American Legion. The following pages offer a closer look at the American Legion, the American Legion Riders, and our local Chapter 220—their mission, values, and the vital role they play in strengthening not just Nocona, but every community touched by our military service members and their families.

The American Legion Family

The American Legion was chartered after World War I by Congress in 1919 as a patriotic veteran's organization. Focusing on service to veterans, service members and communities, the Legion evolved from a group of war-weary veterans of World War I into one of the most influential nonprofit groups in the United States. Membership swiftly grew to over 1 million, and local posts sprang up across the country. Today, membership stands at over 1.6 million in more than 12,000 posts worldwide. The posts are organized into 55 departments: one each for the 50 states, along with the District of Columbia, Puerto Rico, France, Latin America, and the Philippines.

Over the years, the Legion has built its identity by achieving hundreds of benefits and services for veterans, supporting the U.S. Armed Forces and instilling the values of responsible citizenship among young people. From the nation-changing of the American Legion-drafted GI Bill to relief for veterans exposed to toxic contamination in the service, veterans of The American Legion have worked for over a century to improve and strengthen the nation they swore with their lives to defend.

The American Legion family consists of 3 membership groups. Regular Legion members or "Legionnaires", who are US Armed Forces Veterans. Those who have served at least one day of active military duty since December 7, 1941, and were honorably discharged or are still serving active miliary duty honorably, are eligible for membership with The American Legion.

Sons of The American Legion (SAL). Members include males of all ages whose parents or grandparents served in the U.S. military and were eligible for American Legion membership.

American Legion Auxiliary (ALA). Members include grandmothers, mothers, sisters, spouses, and direct and adopted female descendants of all men and women who served.

American Legion Riders

In Garden City, Michigan in 1993, Chuck "Tramp" Dare and Bill "Polka" Kaledas, commander of American Legion Post 396, shared an idea to start a motorcycle enthusiasts association within the organization. The two longtime riders wanted an environment where Legion family members could come together to share a common love for motorcycles.

Joined by 19 other founding members from their post, Dare and Kaledas were flooded with requests for information about their organization. They agreed to establish a central source for the Riders to ensure that chapters formed not as motorcycle clubs or gangs, but as Legionnaires and Auxiliary and SAL members joining to ride as Legion family.

American Legion Riders chapters are well known for their charitable work, which has raised hundreds of thousands of dollars from local children's hospitals, schools, veterans' homes and severely wounded service members. And since 2006, Riders nationwide have participated in The American Legion Legacy Run, first raising money for scholarships for children of U.S. military personnel killed since September 11, 2001, and now for the Veterans & Children Foundation, which funds American Legion service officer training and provides grants for at-risk minor children of Legionnaires and active-duty military.



The American Legion Family

Currently, over 110,000 American Legion Riders meet in over 2,000 chapters in every domestic department and in at least three foreign counties. Riders in Iowa have formed an honor guard called The Five Star Freedom Riders, and Riders in Mulvane, Kansas founded the Patriot Guard to protect the sanctity of military funerals from protesters. Riders in all states have escorted military units returning home from combat tours overseas, conducted massive cross-country fundraising events for wounded warriors from all services, and have raised millions of dollars for countless local, state and national charities. Many Riders, supported by their departments, conduct annual statewide Legacy Runs in direct support of American Legion scholarship programs of Operation Comfort Warriors (OCW), supporting our wounded service memberships across the nation.

True to the Legion's grassroots tradition, each chapter manages its programs at the post level, where the best ideas are born. The Riders are part of many projects and events, including:

- Annual regional rides such as Operation Wounded Warrior, sponsored by Riders in Nevada, Texas, New Mexico, Utah, Arizona, California and other Western states.
- Local charity events in support of The American Legion and local communities.
- Raising money for VA hospitals, women and children centers, children and youth centers, schools and other facilities.
- Sponsoring or participating in motorcycle runs to benefit numerous charities.
- Local memorial ceremonies and community parades.
- The American Legion Legacy Run, an annual cross-country fundraising ride from National Headquarters in Indianapolis to the national convention city.
- Riding to honor fallen military men and women, and to protect the sanctity of their funerals from those who would dishonor their memory.
- Escorting military units to departure airfields and airports for combat tours overseas and welcoming them home upon their return.

All American Legion Rider (ALR) groups must be a program supported by a post or department of The American Legion and shall uphold the declared principles of The American Legion and conform to and abide by the regulations and decisions of the department, post, or other duty constituted department governing body.

American Legion Rider groups shall abide by The American Legion Constitution and By-laws at each level and the established post and department directives, standing rules, etc.

American Legion Riders Chapter 220, Nocona, Texas

In addition to other projects such as the Veteran and Children's Fund (VCF), the Nocona Legion Riders have as an ongoing service commitment, Project RAD (Remembering All Deployed). The purpose of this program is to deliver care packages to deployed service personnel overseas, with a focus on service personnel who do not have the support of family back home or whose family is unable to financially provide care packages. The Nocona Legion Riders work in conjunction with the Family Services Office at Sheppard Air Force Base in Wichita Falls. Periodically, Nocona Legion Riders will put together care packages and deliver them to Sheppard Air Force Base, to be sent overseas. The packages contain items that are approved by the Department of Defense. Items include such things as grooming and hygiene products, coffee, beef jerky, puzzle books and more. The majority of these items are donated by the community. Some cash donations are collected as well, with the money being used to purchase items that are on the DOD approved list.
