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
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Discovery Ahead

Quietly, oh so quietly, The North Texas Hill Country is becoming a scenic destination for folks wishing to leave the urban life behind -- for a day or a lifetime.


The best way to see the hill country is to drive it — whether it is from the front seat of a classic car with the convertible top down, on the back of your favorite motorcycle, or even while peddling your bike along the off-the-beaten path.

With three wineries located in the greater Saint Jo-Nocona area, unique shops, sites and venues to draw your attention, a key to making the most of your visit to The North Texas Hill Country is knowing the best way to traverse the hills and creek bottoms and valleys, or skirt the fringes of the great prairie where the bison herds traveled and were later used by the drovers along the Chisholm Trail.

Whether you take the Wine Tour, or try and find views of the Devil's Backbone, or swing through the undiscovered country down to Montague and Forestburg, your trip will be well worth it.

Settling the Hills of North Texas

The Taovayas Indians made this area their home as early as 1757, and the Wichita, Kiowa, Caddo and Comanche tribes all hunted the land for buffalo and other game.

Nocona was born when D.C. Jordan and William Broadus located their cattle ranch here in 1873. Mr. Jordan donated one square mile of land for a town site, and

in 1887 the town was platted and named after Peta Nocona, the father of the famous Comanche Chief, Quanah Parker. Both Nocona and Saint Jo were ideally situated near the main Red River crossing on the famous Chisholm Trail. Thus they were principal gateways to the Chickasaw Nation, rich in grasslands for the cattle drives north.

Nocona was once known as the "Leather Goods Center of the Southwest." H.J. Justin

moved his cowboy boot manufacturing business from Spanish Fort to Nocona in 1887, and formed H.J. Justin & Sons. In 1925 Justin's sons moved the company to Fort Worth as Justin Boots, which resulted in daughter Enid forming her own boot-making business, the Nocona Boot Company. In 1926 Justin Leather Goods opened in Nocona specialized in the production of small leather items such as coin purses and key holders.

Nocona Leather Goods was also formed, making billfolds and purses. Hard times in 1929 forced the company to reorganize as Nocona Athletic Goods/Nokona, making football, baseball, and other sporting equipment. By 1943 the Company had added the trademark "Nokona" and the Indian head logo.

Today boot-making and ball glove manufacturing are still alive and well, with Fenoglio Boot Company and Nocona Athletic Goods as town centers of manufacturing.

Cattle-ranching has been important to Nocona since the very beginning, and several large cattle operations endure today. Cotton farming was big business right after the turn of the century, and agriculture surged again in 1937 when a fruit research station was created in nearby Montague. Oil was discovered in the area in 1919, and by 1922 oil as a major industry was well on its way. Today, the Barnett Shale natural gas deposit is a major source of area employment.

Local Cattle Brands

Saint Jo is the oldest town in Montague County and from 1849 to 1873 it was known as Head of Elm. Army Captain Randolph Marcy camped here with his surveying crew in 1849 as they mapped out a southern route of the famous Santa Fe Trail. The first settlers arrived here looking for gold, although no gold was ever found. In 1871 there were seven stores in the village, five of which sold whiskey! Great herds of cattle going up the Chisholm Trail were watered here, with the drovers spending a considerable amount of time watering themselves at the Stonewall Saloon.



Bustling Saint Jo

In 1873 the town was surveyed and renamed Saint Jo after founder Joseph Anderson Howell. Some say that the promoters laying out the town were so impressed by the abstinence from alcohol of a surveyor named Jo that they named the town Saint Jo.

Saint Jo's history predates even Nocona's as the western migration of Europeans first reached the Head of Elm. As one of the community's oldest structures, The Stonewall Saloon Museum in Saint Jo is now the focal point of history for the community which once went by the name Head of Elm, for it was there that immigrants and cattle drovers alike stopped for fresh water and paused before entering the Great Prairie.

The Tales 'N' Trails Museum in Nocona opened in 2010 focusing its exhibits and collections on five primary themes -- Native American inhabitation of the region, Western Heritage, Agriculture, Leathergoods and Oil and Gas.

In 2013 the museum dedicated its Indian Hall emphasizing the more than 10,000 year residency of the area by Native Americans.

Most recently volunteers have been actively working building a 9,300-square foot barn, the Millard Filmore Ball Agricultural Activities Center, to tell the widely varied story of agriculture in the area -- from cattle production,

to vineyards, from cotton to the world's largest poultry ranch.

Tales 'n' Trails Museum

The Tales 'N' Trails Museum in Nocona opened in 2010. The 6,400 square foot museum has a true Texas feel.

The new Millard Fillmore Ball Agricultural Centre, set to open to the public in 2017, will house the museum's always expanding agricultural exhibit. It will further expand the stories being told. Soon to follow is a new boot-making and

leather-goods exhibit and expanded Native American exhibit.

The Native American Hall highlights the extensive Native American artifacts from the original Joe Benton Collection, one of the most extensive private collections in the country. The Hall has many interactive components, including an award-winning video broken up into vignettes used throughout the hall.

Exhibits include two of Del Motley's massive, leathercarved religious artwork, "The

Good Shepherd" and "The Last Supper."

"New" exhibits include a fully functional, one-sixth scale 1924 Fort Worth Spudder; the donation of a restored 400-600 year old Native American pot; and the John Glaze exhibit on boot making which includes an extensive research archive on the craft dating from 1800.

The Museum also conducts special exhibits and activities throughout the year held in conjunction with community events. Kids have fun at the History Mystery Summer Camp and guests enjoy a rousing time at the annual Shebang! Fundraiser, held each September.



The Stonewall Saloon Museum in Saint Jo was among the first permanent structures in the city, if not the first. After many years of closure and decline, the building was purchased by a group of interested citizens wanting to not only save this piece of local history, but stimulate local tourism on the square.

That group has undertaken fundraising to restore the building, and it has reopened to visitors. As they strive to tell the stories of Head of Elm, as Saint Jo was once known, the renovation uncovered some surprises including some century-old artwork pictured to the right.

The Stonewall Saloon Museum is open from 10 a.m. to 5 p.m. on Saturdays and 1 to 5 p.m. on Sundays, or by appointment. Admission is by donation.

Country "...unlike anything or anyone else; very special ... unusual ..."


Homage to Things That Suck






Tour Historic Nocona

What started out as an Eagle Scout Project for Joseph Storey in 2010, the Tour Historic Nocona Project soon gained a life of its own.

The project was designed to identify unique and historic homes and buildings in Nocona. Along with his fellow Scouts, Joseph had fifteen metal arrowheads fabricated. Then they erected these markers on poles in the front of locations around town chosen in conjunction with the Nocona Chamber of Commerce as an Historic Driving Tour. Now the project marks thirty-six locations on the Tour.

In 2013 the Nocona Chamber of Commerce developed a booklet called "Visit Historic Nocona" featuring the descriptions and a map of the locations, businesses, and homes marked by the wayfaring markers along the driving tour.

This booklet is for sale through either the Nocona Chamber of Commerce or at the Gift Shop at the Tales 'N'Trails Museum.


One of the most noted sites on the Driving Tour is the beautiful historic Central Christian Church, located at the corner of Cooke and East Elm Streets. A landmark church built in the shape of a cross, or "Carpenter Gothic" design, with its bell tower pointing toward the heavens, it is touted as the oldest congregation and church building in the community. Central

boasts a Texas Historical Marker, and yet still has an active congregation which meets regularly for worship, study, and mission projects.

Central Christian Church (formerly known as First Christian Church) celebrated its 125th Anniversary in 2013, and meetings have been held in the sanctuary of this building since 1894. The

unique architecture of the worship center is appealing to those who come through the doors, and yet the spirit of the building calls one to reverence of the Holy and to movement outside the old clapboard walls into the mission to which Christians are called.

The public is invited to worship with the Disciples of Christ on Sundays at 11 a.m. Mid-week tours can be arranged by calling the Church office at (940) 825-3794.

Other historic sites are included on the tour.

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

First, book your visit at Texas Kings Hotel or the Rock House Overnight Stay. You'll want to start your morning at the Chisholm Coffee Company with one of their great lattes and breakfast offerings.

Ready for the day, "go west" for a stop at Williams Creek, a boutique. With an eye for a twist on western fashion, maybe their hand-crafted rhinestone encrusted boots are just what you need.

Move on around our city square and shop Trailtown Treasures. Here you'll find an ever changing collection of antiques and craft items from local artisans and collectors. The ATM is next door — just in case.

Panache, your next stop, is located in an historic hardware store, it still boasts the original display pieces, but instead of nails and bolts, you'll find candles, lotions, and all kinds

of wonderful smelly stuff. But the fun doesn't stop there. Their clothing lines offer fun for girls of all ages. Want to pick up something new for the house, they've got that too.

Now for our history buffs, it's time to get serious. The Museum of the Stonewall Saloon is a MUST. With revolving (and revolvers) collections depicting the time when the Stonewall was a watering hole as drovers moved cattle to the Chisholm Trail. The Museum has been meticulously restored and its staff provides detailed information that brings our history to life.

Time for food. The Lazy Heart Grill offers the best chicken fried steak around. Sit by the window and enjoy the view, the food, and the ambiance the Grill provides.

Mike Karnes Bootmaker and C.T. Chappell Boots is just down the street. Step inside and you are in for a treat. Carl Chappell and Mike Karnes just happen to be rather famous nationally known boot makers. Their craft is on

display and their stories are even better!

Cowgirl Hall of Fame inductee Donna Howell-Sickles' gallery and gift shop

are next. First, the Main Street Gallery, wait where are we — Santa Fe? No Dorothy, it's Saint Jo. Enjoy art from across the country, from contemporary and traditional, oils and pastels, wood and metal. Next door is Davis & Blevins gift shop that will keep you browsing long after you thought you were done.

Opening in early 2017, the International Ordnance Museum is home to the largest private collection of artillery in the United States. Featured in the 20,000 square foot museum is a diverse collection of artillery and other deactivated ordnance from the United States, Great Britain, Germany, Japan, Russia along



with other countries.
Eras range from WWII,
Korea, Vietnam, Cold
War, to the Middle
Eastern wars.

You may have seen this building before and wished it were yours, but now it's our newest addition to shopping options in town, the Village Market. Located in the angled, corner gas station, the Village Market has it all. Clothing, furnishings, and all the fun the building and you deserve. They will be expanding soon to extend their offerings, but don't wait, it's so much fun now!

Back to Chisholm Coffee Company, grab another coffee, then off to the wineries. Where to start – there's Arche, Blue Ostrich, or 4R Ranch Vineyard and Winery. So many choices! Got to go!




Montague County Youth Fair



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Mardi Gras, Nocona Style



Nocona may seem a long way from New Orleans, but the spirit of Mardi Gras is alive and well in Nocona. Hosted by the Chamber of Commerce, Mardi Gras comes to town each February as a three-day Cajun festival with vendors, Cajun music and food, and lots of fun.

Decorated to the nines in purple, green, and gold, the whole town gets into the spirit. The festival kicks off with a costumed pet parade on Thursday and a parade of colorfully decorated ATVs on Friday. Saturday begins with a 5K Fun Run and a Kiddie Parade then add Cajun food, vendors and musicians at multiple locations, and the weekend is set for the grand finale -- the Mardi Gras Parade, which lures thousands of people to town.

With colorful and inventive floats, riders on horseback, classic cars, ATVs, and motorcycles this family-friendly festival -- Mardi Gras with a Texas twist -- continues to grow each year.






Saint Jo Ladies Night Out

Besides the Trailtown's historic square being decorated for the occasion, the evening is designed to provide a good excuse for the ladies of the house to get out, visit, shop, mingle, enjoy the tasting trays at several of the community's unique shops and have a great time.

"Find something to do"

Those were Mildred Nunneley's instructions to her late husband Earl Nunneley. After retirement, the engineer, rancher and thinker was underfoot when the misses shooed him out of the house with those instructions. As she has repeatedly laughed, she did not fully appreciate the consequences of her comment.

Earl decided to take a piece of family property south of Saint Jo and turn it into something "unique"—8-foot diameter flowers made out of old satellite dishes, Volkswagen bugs converted into Lady Bugs, a fan of telephone poles aligned to cast one shadow twice a year, engine cowlings made into Indian paintbrush and much, much more.

The family has since added to the display, located on the southwest corner of the intersection of FM 677 and FM 3206 about 2 miles south of Saint Jo.

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Vicari Car Auction



In developing their car collection housed at the Horton Classic Car Museum, Pete and Barbara Horton formed a close relationship with Pete Vicari, which in turn helped bring the Vicari Auction Company and its fast paced, high-octane classic and muscle car auction to Nocona in the spring of 2013. The Biloxi-based auction company is featured in the NBC Sports TV show, "Bidding Wars," where viewers get a detailed look at the Vicari Collector Car Auctions, showing the action between the Ringman, Bidder, Auctioneer and Seller. You never know who may show up at one of their

auctions! In the auction's first year, the Vicari auctioneers sold more than \$2.6 million in cars! In its second year, over \$3 million in vehicles changed hands, and an estimated 4,000 people filled the town.

In 2014 the auction expanded to include two full days of auction activities

held during the annual spring event, Cruisin' Nocona, showcases Nocona's moniker as the "Classic Car Capital of Texas" and adds to its reputation as one of the most "Fun Small Towns in America" as determined by Rand McNally. This three-day festival is held each May, and includes a Classic Car Poker Cruise, a Parade of Classic Cars through downtown and the surrounding hill country of the Red River Valley, daily car shows, and lots of music, food, vendors, and other fun activities.

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
Iron Jacket Tournament

Chisholm Trail Round-up Rodeo

Every year, beginning in 1952, Nocona has celebrated its western heritage with the annual Chisholm Trail Round-up Rodeo.

Coordinated by the Nocona Chamber of Commerce, sanctioned



by the UPRA and TCRA, the rodeo is held the second Friday and Saturday in June. Visitors can enjoy two nights of rodeo action at the Chisholm Trail Rodeo Arena (734 Montague St.). The event has more than 350 participants competing for prize money in all the traditional events of bareback riding, saddle bronc and open ranch bronc riding, steer wrestling, team and breakaway roping, barrel racing, and bull riding.

There's mutton bustin' for the little cowpokes, and a Rodeo Queen and Princess contest. The big Rodeo Parade winds through downtown Nocona, with community organizations, school bands, and clubs participating alongside horses and riders, cars and floats. A BBQ dinner, community dance and western band rounds out the weekend on Saturday night.

Saint Jo Rodeo

The Saint Jo Riding Club has been hosting the annual Saint Jo Rodeo for sixty years. Now held the first weekend in May, the club provides two days of

top rodeo action at the club arena at the eastern edge of town on US Hwy 82. All the traditional events are included, along with popular mutton bustin' for the little cowpokes. A rodeo parade sponsored by the Saint Jo Chamber of Commerce circles the Town Square, featuring floats, equestrian and riding clubs, and individual entries. The club also hosts a Rodeo Queen, Junior Queen and Princess contest for those cowgirls living within a hundred miles of Saint Jo.

Bullfest

The Annual Bullfest is held each May at the Nocona Chisholm Trail Rodeo Arena, 734 Montague St. The event includes mutton bustin', a children's calf scramble, a women's steer scramble and the always-hilarious donkey race, in addition to the main event of bull riding. Sanctioned by the United Professional Rodeo Association and sponsored by the Big L Rodeo Company, this rodeo event features professional bull riders from Texas, Oklahoma, and other states. The concession stand is in full operation, supporting Nocona's Rotary Club's community projects and college scholarship fund.





Celebrating the 150th Anniversary of the Chisholm Trail, Nocona has scheduled a number of events and activities:

On June 8th, K.R. Wood comes to town with his Camp Cookie Wild West Show & Chuckwagon Dinner. This Old Chisholm Trail Show showcases Texas history and features such fun events as trick roping and twirling, gunfight re-enactments, trick shooting, cowboy poetry, and the music of Camp Cookie (KR Wood) and the Cow Camp Revue along with an authentic chuckwagon dinner.

On June 9th and 10th is the 65th Annual Chisholm Trail Roundup Rodeo, celebrating our western traditions with all the pageantry and action of the annual rodeo and a parade through downtown Nocona. Horses and riders, cars and floats, rodeo clowns and a BBQ meal all help Nocona celebrate its Chisholm Trail history.

On June 12th through 16th is the Chisholm Trail History Mystery Camp, a weeklong day camp for little buckaroos and cowgirls held at Tales 'N' Trails Museum. This children's camp is a

fun way for kids to learn about the trail driving era and its importance to Montague County.

From July 1st through August 15th will be the Chisholm Trail Art Association's Chisholm Trail Western Art Show, also at Tales 'N' Trails Museum. This art show focuses on the cattle drive era of the late 1800s, so is not your typical western art show!

Saint Jo boasts the distinction as being one of only two towns still in extistence today that were actually on the trail, which makes us especially excited about the 150th Anniversary of the Chisholm Trail. No better record of our significance is the Stonewall Saloon Museum on the square. The Museum will host displays of western artifacts of the era that will take you back to the days of drovers, drives, and the ol' West.

Our "Ride the Trail" event will include a symposium with nationally known historians of the Chisholm Trail who will discuss the trail, its tales, and the men that were there. The "Ride the Trail" will outline the actual route of the trail based on extensive research and allow participants to "Ride the Trail" as feasibly possible along today's roads. The culminating event of the day will be a chuck wagon dinner at a ranch that was on the trail with demonstrations of branding, roping, and similar activities that the cowboys on the trail would have experienced. There may even be a longhorn or two for a photo op!!

The Chisholm Trail Celebration theme will be part of Saint Jo's 4th of July celebration, well known as one the most outstanding fireworks displays in the area. The Ol' Jo's Firecracker 5K Run will sport the Chisholm brand as well.

Moving into August, the 60th Annual Saint Jo Riding Club Parade and Rodeo will include special attention to the Chisholm Trail. Saint Jo's rodeo has long established its professionalism in presentation, caliber of competition, and fun for the entire family.

Saint Jo will top off its celebration of the 150th with a Gala on the Chisholm Trail Square in Saint Jo. The day will include fun crafts and displays for the entire family topped off with music and entertainment on the streets in the evening.

A patriotic Children's Parade rolls through the town square, and there's even an ice cream freeze-off!



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

Housed in a former Ford dealership building downtown, the collection is a virtual wonderland for car enthusiasts.

The Hortons also have teamed with the City of Nocona to save and restore many of the

downtown buildings. Their efforts continue today, providing an enormous economic boost to the revitalization of downtown and the surrounding community.

Owned by Pete and Barbara Horton and managed by Billy Dean Dobbs, the museum's collection features 138 cars focusing on American vintage, classic, and muscle cars. More than forty Corvettes are included from nearly every model year of production.

Several 1950s-era convertibles also are included in the collection, along with many Senior Award

Winners from the Chevy and Pontiac Nationals. Different and often rare models of Chevrolets, Fords, Pontiacs, Packards, Plymouths, Oldsmobiles, Buicks, and Studebakers are included in the collection, which is always changing and growing.

To put it into perspective, the total horsepower of all the cars in the Horton Classic Car Museum

is 46,347 or over 46 megawatts. That's enough to power over 23,000 homes! With its newly opened addition, the museum now encompasses 37,400 square feet of space, and allows nearly the entire Horton collection to be viewed in a single location.

The museum is open Monday through Friday from 9 a.m. to 4 p.m. and Saturday from 9 a.m. to 5 p.m. The museum is closed on Sundays and all major holidays.

Admission is \$12 per person. Seniors admission is \$10 and Youth admission is \$8. Kids under age 8 get in free with adult supervision, and all veterans, military personnel, police and firemen get in free with valid identification. Group discounts are available. Visit



Lake Nocona


Eight miles northeast of Nocona, off FM 2634, sits the 1,323-acre Lake Nocona. Constructed in 1960, the lake is used for both municipal and industrial purposes. Lake Nocona offers an ideal fishing environment for largemouth bass, flathead catfish, blue catfish, and crappie, with even a chance at catching white bass, palmetto bass, tiger muskellunge, hybrid striped bass, and sunfish! Three parks are scattered around the shores of the lake: Weldon Robb Park, Joe Benton Park, and Boone Park.

All three parks feature boat ramps, restrooms, parking, picnic and camping areas. Weldon Robb Park and Joe Benton Park also have courtesy docks, and Joe Benton Park has handicap access. For more information, contact the North Montague County Water Supply District at (940) 825-3282.

To access the lake go north on FM 103 out of Nocona and then east on FM 2634.


The Fenoglio Boot Company continues this legacy of high quality and exceptionally crafted, handmade cowboy boota.

Indian Oaks Golf Course

Montague North Field

Between Nocona and the Red River lies the Montague County North Field. Scattered like large, mechanical black and brown ants across the sloping terrain of the Red River Valley motorists can see scores of pump jacks deliberately extracting oil from this field. While by no means is it the only oil field in the North Texas Hill Country a drive through the North Field grants grand vistas of the Red River Valley.

First opened in 1922, there are still some wells producing oil seven, eight and nine decades after they were first drilled!

And on occasion you might see a bit of 'art' attached to the top of a pump jack. While at one time there was a Snoopy, and a Tweetie Bird, now all that which has withstood the wind is a Rabbit. See if you can find it.

Nocona Leather Goods got its start in 1926 making billfolds, purses and wallets, then began adding football, baseball, and other sports equipment to the line in 1929 when the Storey family took over the company. In 1943 the company added the trademark Indian head logo and the name of "Nokona". Thus began a three-generation tradition of 100% American-made products, as Nokona Ball Glove factory is the only company still making ball gloves in the U.S., handmade by Americans

who carefully cut, stamp, stitch, lace and embroider each glove by hand.

No two Nokona gloves are identical, and each has its own identity and feel.

Nokona Ball Glove Factory tours are given Monday and Friday at 10:30 a.m. and again at 1:30 p.m. The cost is \$5 per person, with discounts for kids and veterans. 



Wineries

Located just north and east of Saint Jo lie three wineries which are rapidly establishing themselves among wine aficionados.

Family owned and operated Blue Ostrich Winery & Vineyard was once one of the foremost ostrich breeding and ranching facilities in the southwest. The structure that houses the winery, tasting room and corporate offices was once filled with ostrich eggs,

chicks and fledglings. The acreage to the west that nurtures Tempranillo, Viognier and Cabernet grapevines was the same hillside where hundreds of ostriches roamed during the 1980s and 1990s. As the Fredrick family's ostrich ranching adventure drew to a close, the future of the last seven birds remained uncertain — until a name for the new winery and vineyard was needed. Today the ostrich not only adorns the Blue Ostrich label, but the birds also function as official winery mascots, welcoming guests to the beautiful Red River Valley.

Blue Ostrich Winery & Vineyard is located just eight and a half miles north of Saint Jo on FM 2382. Operating hours vary by season, so please call the winery for current operating hours or for tour information: (940) 995-3100 or visit their website: www.blueostrich.net.

One valley to the west lies Arché Vineyard and Winery, family owned and operated by Howard and

Amy Davies with their son, Grayson, as Winemaker. The family started growing grapes under the name of Oak Creek Vineyards in 1999, the first commercial wine-grape vineyard in Montague County. After several years of selling their grapes to other Texas wineries, the Davies established their own winery, Arché, in 2007. Arché (pronounced ar-kay) means "beginning or origin."

The Winery currently produces about 1,500 cases per year with most being from the grapes they grow along





Dedication of the Chisholm Trail marker for the Head of Elm (Saint Jo)


The Chisholm Trail Marker Project was the passion of Billy Cate, professional cowboy singer and president of the Johnson County Historical Commission. Cate constructed 300 concrete markers to be placed from San Antonio to Red River Station marking the route of the famous Chisholm Trail.

Members of the Montague County Historical Commission and Texas Lakes Trails, as well as Boy Scout Troop 108 from Nocona and Troop 22 from Wichita Falls, worked together to place thirteen of these markers within Montague County.

The first two of the county's markers were placed at Victoria Peak (Queen's Peak) and Head of Elm (Saint Jo) in May and June of 2009, with a formal dedication ceremony on the Saint Jo Square on June 5, 2009.

What followed were eleven additional markers placed at various points in Montague County in Bowie, Bonita, Nocona, Spanish Fort, Sunset, Belcherville, and Red River Station, where the last maker was dedicated on September 26, 2009.







Veterans Memorial



In 2012, veterans approached the Commissioners Court to discuss a recommendation that the county erect a memorial to all of those who have served in the Armed Forces of the United States.

For more than two years workers gutted the building then created a modern, 24 bed motel complete with a kitchen, conference room and fitness center.

Next the family tackled the concurrent construction of an RV center with 29 pull-through bays as well as the 5,000 square foot Veranda Event Center. The Event Center, which can comfortably handle up to 250 dinner guests, has played host to banquets, family reunions, bridal receptions, conferences and concerts including several concerts each year for Nocona Nights.

If your taste leans towards the more casual, homey life of a Bed and Breakfast, the Fenoglios offer that as well. For more than 100 years the family home, located at the corner of U.S. Hwy. 82 and Denison Street, has seen double duty also serving as lodging for travelers as well as a residence.

In 1916 a second story was added to the home. It was at that time that Robert's grandmother began taking in boarders, primarily travelers on the train. In fact, while Robert's father Henry was away serving in the U.S. Army during World War II, Robert recalls as a small child being told that more than once he lost his bedroom for the night to a lodger and slept with his grandmother.

The Fenoglios have completely renovated the family home which now serves as a bed and breakfast rented through The Veranda Inn.

The Fenoglios are not finished, they are currently completing the Veranda Hide-a-ways, 20 extended-stay rooms being constructed on a small creek behind the Veranda Event Center.

Taovayas Indian Bridge

For more than 50 years residents of northern Montague County had been trying to get the Texas and Oklahoma Highway Commissions to replace five bridges and two ferries lost to the Red River.

The Nocona Chamber of Commerce convinced the Texas Transportation Commission in 1990 to approve the bridge by taking the second largest delegation in history to Austin.

In 1994 the Texas and Oklahoma Departments of Transportation held dedication ceremonies for the Taovayas Indian Bridge. The Taovayas were the largest clan of the Wichita who lived on both sides of the river in the area of Spanish Fort in the 18th Century.

The Nocona Chamber recommended the name, and members of the Wichita & Affiliated Tribes attended taking part in the dedication including blessing the bridge.



An ambitious fund-raising effort is underway to expand and improve the decades long investment by the late Enid Justin and the Nocona Lions Club who helped establish the








Enid Justin City Park.

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
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
